HISTORIC PENSACOLA HIGHLIGHTS

Tivoli High House (1976) 205 East Zaragoza Street

Reconstructed in 1976, the original Tivoli High House, 1805, was once a boarding and gaming



house. To the east of the original structure was a large octagonal theatre and ballroom that served as a meeting place for early Pensacolians. The first floor serves as the Historic Pensacola museum store and ticket office.

Lear/Rocheblave House (1890)

214 East Zaragoza Street

An architectural example of a two story Folk Victorian style house. The house was built for John and Kate Lear, who divorced the year it was built. Benito Rocheblave and his family lived in the house from 1897-1910.



Manuel Barrios Cottage (1888)

207 East Zaragoza Street

The pyramidal roof Gulf Coast cottage was once a common sight in Pensacola. Today this cottage is outfitted 1940s USO memorabilia and decor.



McMillan House (1888) **Appleyard Storytelling Cottage**

213 East Zaragoza Street

This Gulf Coast Cottage was saved from demolition and relocated to the Historic Pensacola Village in 2008. The interior has been transformed into a 1950s living room where you can hear stories about Pensacola from John Appleyard.



Dorr House (1871)

311 South Adams Street

Built in 1871 by Clara Barkley Dorr, the widow of a lumber tycoon, Dorr House is an example of Greek Revival architecture in West Florida.



Old Christ Church (1832)

405 South Adams Street

One of the oldest surviving church buildings in Florida, Old Christ Church has served the community as an Episcopal Church, public library, and museum. Today it continues to serve West Florida as a museum, special event facility and meeting hall.



Pensacola Museum of History (1907)

330 S. Jefferson Street

This elaborate Renaissance Revival building was the height of architectural fashion when it was built as Pensacola's City Hall. Rotating exhibits portray West Florida's history, architecture, and archaeology.



The Pensacola Children's Museum (1885)

115 East Zaragoza Street

Constructed in 1885, this two-story structure, now home to the Pensacola Children's Museum, once housed the Gulf Saloon. Today, you will find hands-on activities, exhibits and public programs for children.



Pensacola Museum of Art (1906)

407 South Jefferson Street

This building which once served as the Pensacola City Jail is now a modern-day art museum and arts education hub.



Museum of Industry (1870)

200 East Zaragoza Street

The Museum of Industry houses an exhibit depicting several early industries in West Florida. The fishing, brickmaking, railroad, and lumber industries, which contributed to Pensacola's 19th-century industrial boom, are represented through photographs, tools and equipment.



Museum of Commerce (1890)

201 East Zaragoza Street

Inside this large brick late 1800s warehouse is a reconstructed 1890s era streetscape. On exhibit are historic shops featuring toys, hardware, music and leather goods.



Lavalle House (1805) 205 East Church Street

An architectural example of French Creole colonial


cottage, the Lavalle house was built during Florida's second Spanish period by Charles Lavalle and Marianna Bonifay. The house is furnished with authentic 18th and 19th-century artifacts recreating the frontier lifestyle of Pensacola in the 1820s.



Julee Cottage (1805)

210 East Zaragoza Street

Visitors will learn about the rich African-American history of Pensacola in the Julee Cottage. This exhibit is dedicated to the memory of Pensacolian Julee Panton, a free woman of color who owned the cottage.
